Reception

In Reception this week, we performed The Little Red Hen to all the Reception staff and were even filmed doing it. Mrs Edwards happened to be showing some propsective parents round said they peered round the door to the Activity Studio to see us and were blown away by how good we were. Apparently, the recording is going to put put onto Tapestry, so please look out for it. We've been learning the sounds g and o and blending with all the sounds we've learned so far this term. We've been subtising in Maths, which is when you are able to look at a group of objects and realise how many there are without counting. We're really enjoying our Wake-Up, Shake-Up and Funky-Feet-Friday sessions and have had a wonderful first term. We're already excited about next term and hope that all our friends who have been poorly with Covid, as well and Mrs Bentley and Mrs Loveday will be feeling much better.

Year 1

As part of our celebration of Black History Month, we've been learning about Rose Parks, Mo Farah and Usain Bolt, celebrating their lives and achievements. Whilst we've been thinking about them, we've also been thinking about ourselves and our voices, through words, actions and creativity. In Maths, we are learning to measure length using uniform non-standard units such as cubes, feet and hands and about standard units of measure such as centimetres. We've been inspired by the work of Alma Woodsey-Thomas in art and enjoyed designing colourful shape paintings. In Science, we've been getting our hands on different materials, investigating and comparing them and considering their properties and uses and we can't wait to perform the September 1666 song we've learned to sign and sing.

Year 2

As part of Black History Month, we've been listening to black musicians during our early morning work and music lesson this week. We also learned about Ruby Bridges, her fight to be educated fairly and exploring what her life was like through drama. We've found it really interesting to compare the protests that she faced to the current Black Lives Matter movement in the UK. We've completed different end of term Reading and Maths Assessments and have enjoyed the Tag-Rugby and Yoga sessions this term.

Year 3

This week, we've been thinking about what we care deeply about, who inspires us and how we can become an inspirational person. We completed a reading comprehension about Marcus Rashford and his achievements and used the information to create a fact file about him. We then created a collaborative letter to Marcus, sharing how he has inspired us to collect food for charity. In Topic, we've continued to create and paint our Ancient Egyptian collars with patterns and symbolic animals and used a variety of materials to create a realistic effect.





Year 4

In English this week, we've been completing Big Writes and have written our own Just So stories drawing from our learning so far this term. We've worked in groups to create our own rafts from materials we collected over the weekend and beginning of this week. This links to our guided reading book 'The Explorer' where our heroes, who are lost in the Amazon,



attempt to build a raft to make their way back to civilization, using only what is available to them in the rainforest.

Year 5

After planning some pretty exciting Beowulf stories, that included a range of interesting beasts and ghoulish monsters, we wrote them this week. We've tried hard to keep the reader engaged with powerful and exciting vocabulary. In Maths, we've continued our statistics topic, reading and interpreting tables, timetables and line graphs and using these to solve problems. We've really enjoyed collaborating and investigating which type of material will make a good cloth for cleaning. Year 6

Well, it's certainly been quite a week for us. After our truly fabulous week at Skern Lodge, we returned to discover that many of us had caught Covid, including Ms Rogers and Mrs Nicholls. For those of us at home we've adapted to learning remotely with Ms Rogers leading the sessions whilst Mr Cook has been teaching an ever decreasing number of us in school. We're really hoping that our friends and staff who do have Covid really don't become too poorly and recover well. Thank you again to ALL the staff who led and supported us on our Residential last week, it was amazing!

School Council

Wow, what an amazing first term this has been! New site and lots of exciting projects from school council. We started fundraising as soon as we got back into school in September with our Jeans for Genes day.
